In 2016, he graduated with an Honours degree in Travel, Tourism, Hospitality & Event Management. Driven by his deep love for tourism, Moses began his career with a job attachment at Sperrgebiet National Park, where he fell in love with the desert.

Later in 2016, he joined Wolwedans Collection as a trainee guide. After six months of intensive training, honing his skills in desert guiding, star gazing, and communication, he became a certified guide. Moses's journey with Wilderness began in October 2017 at Doro Nawas. He later worked at Damaraland Camp and Hoanib Skeleton Coast Camp before moving to Serra Cafema in early 2023. With eight years of experience and exposure to four camps, Moses cherishes the extraordinary opportunities for growth and knowledge he has received.

Some highlights of his career include working closely with local communities, enhancing his photography skills, and even learning basic French to connect better with guests. Moses is passionate about capturing the stunning landscapes and wildlife of Namibia, striving to master the art of wildlife and landscape photography. Currently, he aims to complete his NATH Level 4 guiding certification and further develop his expertise to represent Wilderness at the highest level.

What he loves most about being a Wilderness guide is the continuous training and opportunities for personal growth. He values the sense of contributing to something larger and cherishes witnessing guests' joy in experiencing the wilderness. One of his most memorable wildlife encounters involved observing elephants taking a two-hour nap near his vehicle while he and guests watched from a safe vantage point.
