

# Kulala Wilderness Reserve

- The Namib Sand Sea is a World Heritage Site, and here, Sossusvlei is the
  result of a series of fascinating geological events. The flow of the ephemeral
  Tsauchab River, now blocked by a mass of sand, is flanked by some of the
  tallest dunes in the world.
- Trek up the dunes, including the iconic Big Daddy, or float high over the dune field and mysterious fairy circles in a hot air balloon.
- Deadvlei: A series pans (or vleis) dotted with skeletons of camelthorn trees monuments to the sudden change in climate over 1 000 years ago now a photographer's paradise.
- Sesriem Canyon: The result of millions of years of water carving its way
  across the topography, Sesriem Canyon is a geological wonder. The three
  kilometres of gorge reveal breath-taking views from the top and fascinating
  walks within.



### Damaraland

- The dramatic and incomparable, moonlike landscape is characterised by dramatic flat-topped mountains, wind-sculpted sandstone cliffs, broad valleys and dry riverbeds.
- In years of good rainfall, the riverbeds spring to life and flow sporadically, while the vast open plains are covered by seasonal grasses.
- Remarkable wildlife is seen. Africa's last remaining free-ranging populations
  of Critically Endangered desert-adapted black rhino. Desert-adapted
  elephants and giraffes follow the sporadically flowing river courses, where
  trees find life through the presence of underground water. Other wildlife
  includes lions, spotted hyenas, cheetahs, leopards, Hartmann's mountain
  zebras, gemsbok and springbok.

### Kaokoveld

- The Atlantic's unpredictable, cold Benguela current meets the warm desert air, creating a moody micro-climate and an evocative and unique atmosphere.
- Steeped in history, the haunting coastline is strewn with skeletons of the many
  whales that have been stranded along the rocky shores, as well as shipwreck remains,
  lost in the thick fog, rough seas, strong currents and stormy winds.
- The permanently flowing Kunene River, that forms the border of Namibia with Angola, is a remarkable oasis carving through a valley of sweeping rocky mountain landscape. This contrast between the lush river valley and arid surroundings is aweinspiring.
- The Koakoveld is an unforgiving but truly spectacular environment, with endless
  vistas across stark plains, ancient valleys, rugged peaks and sandy dunes ending at
  the desolate shores of the Skeleton Coast. Flying into the area also reveals the
  mystical fairy circles.
