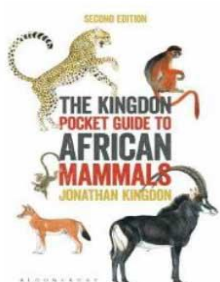

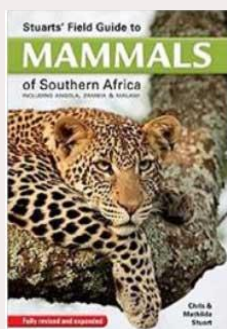

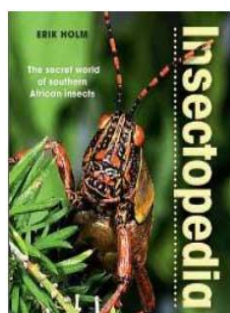

The field guide of choice to take on an African safari. Its compact format makes it ideal for use in the field, while its coverage is the most comprehensive currently possible in this format.



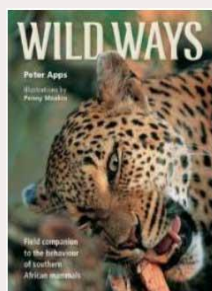

An excellent photographic field guide for Southern Africa with colour plates and distribution maps for easy use. Now includes Angola, Zambia, Malawi and northern Mozambique.



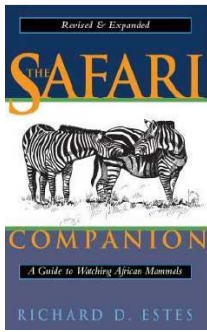

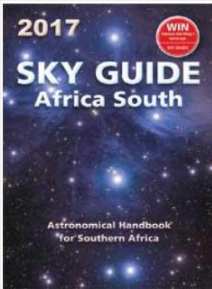

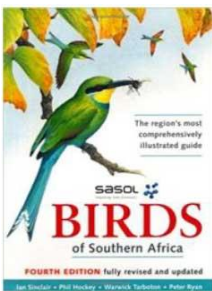

This astronomical handbook for Southern Africa, is an invaluable practical resource for anyone who has even a passing interest in the night skies of Southern Africa.



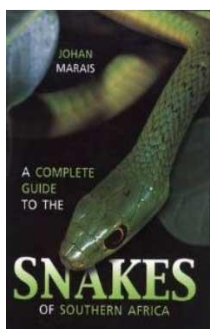

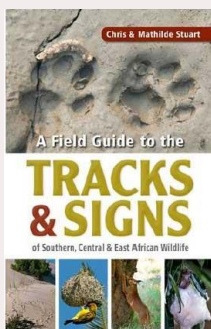

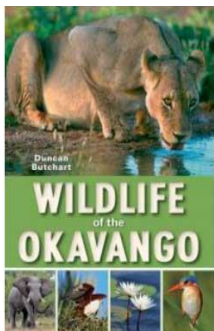

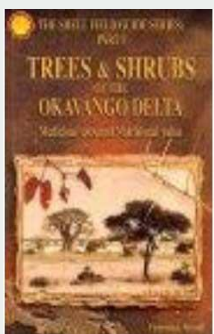

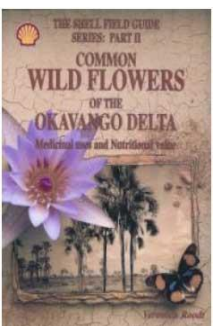

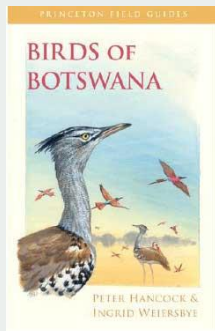

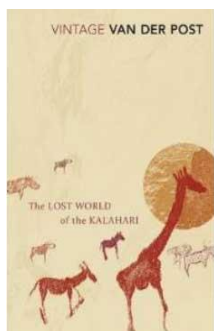

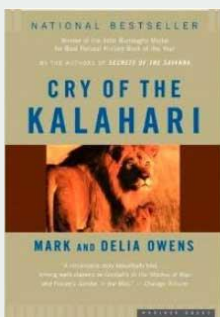
