ABOUT THE AREA

The Mara Triangle offers one of the most exclusive and rewarding safari experiences in the greater Masai Mara. Managed by the Mara Conservancy, this region is renowned for its innovative conservation model: a successful publicprivate partnership that ensures well-maintained roads, effective anti-poaching patrols, and sustainable tourism practices. With fewer lodges and vehicles, sightings feel exclusive and unhurried, especially during the Great Migration's dramatic river crossings. The Triangle pulses with life: predators aplenty, elephants, black rhino, and exceptional birdlife – set against a striking mix of open plains, riverine forest, and seasonal marsh.

BEST TIME TO TRAVEL

January to February

- Grass is still relatively short at the beginning of the year, with growth increasing towards February.
- Spotting wildlife, including big cats still reasonably easy.
- Pleasant weather with minimal rain.

March to May

- Increasing rainfall with a peak in late March to May.
- With the higher grass, wildlife can be harder to spot.
- Excellent for birdwatching and photography.

June to September

- Rainfall decreases, trees drop leaves, and grass becomes shorter, making it easier to spot wildlife.
- From July to August, the Great Migration arrives, marked by iconic crossings at the Mara River, with a peak in September.
- Big cats follow the herds.

October to December

- The Migration starts to move South.
- Dry weather conditions with occasional showers are expected to increase towards December.
- Vegetation turns green with resident wildlife still active.
