# December to March

• With good rains, a tapestry of grassland.

BEST TIME TO VISIT

- Arid-adapted species are easily seen.
- Desert-adapted elephants move from the ephemeral river systems into the surrounding hilly regions.
- Late summer rain in higher-lying catchment areas can turn the sandy riverbeds into a brief torrent of life-giving water.

### April to May

- Calm, comfortable days and pleasant evenings.
- Desert-adapted elephants start moving back to the ephemeral river systems.

#### June to November

- Game species such as desert-adapted elephants and lion, giraffes and kudu tend to concentrate along these river systems and natural springs.
- Towards November, moisture in the air from the coastal fog results in trees slowly turning green

### CAMPS TO COMBINE WITH

Start your Namibia experience with a stay at Little Kulala and explore the Kulala Wilderness Reserve, Sossusvlei, and Deadvlei.

Travel north to the Kunene River for a stay at Serra Cafema, one of the few areas in Namibia where guests can experience water activities during a boating experience, explore the dunes and connect with the local Himba community.

An alternative option could be Hoanib Skeleton Coast Camp with a day visit to the Skeleton Coast and exploring the Hoanib riverbed.

Wilderness Desert Rhino Camp is set in a valley in the midst of the expansive 583 000 hectare Palmwag Concession, and looks out over a sweeping plain dotted with Namibia's fascinating national plant, the welwitschia. It is here, in the seemingly endless desert, that trackers patrol and protect one of the largest free-ranging populations of Critically Endangered desert-adapted black rhino in Africa.
