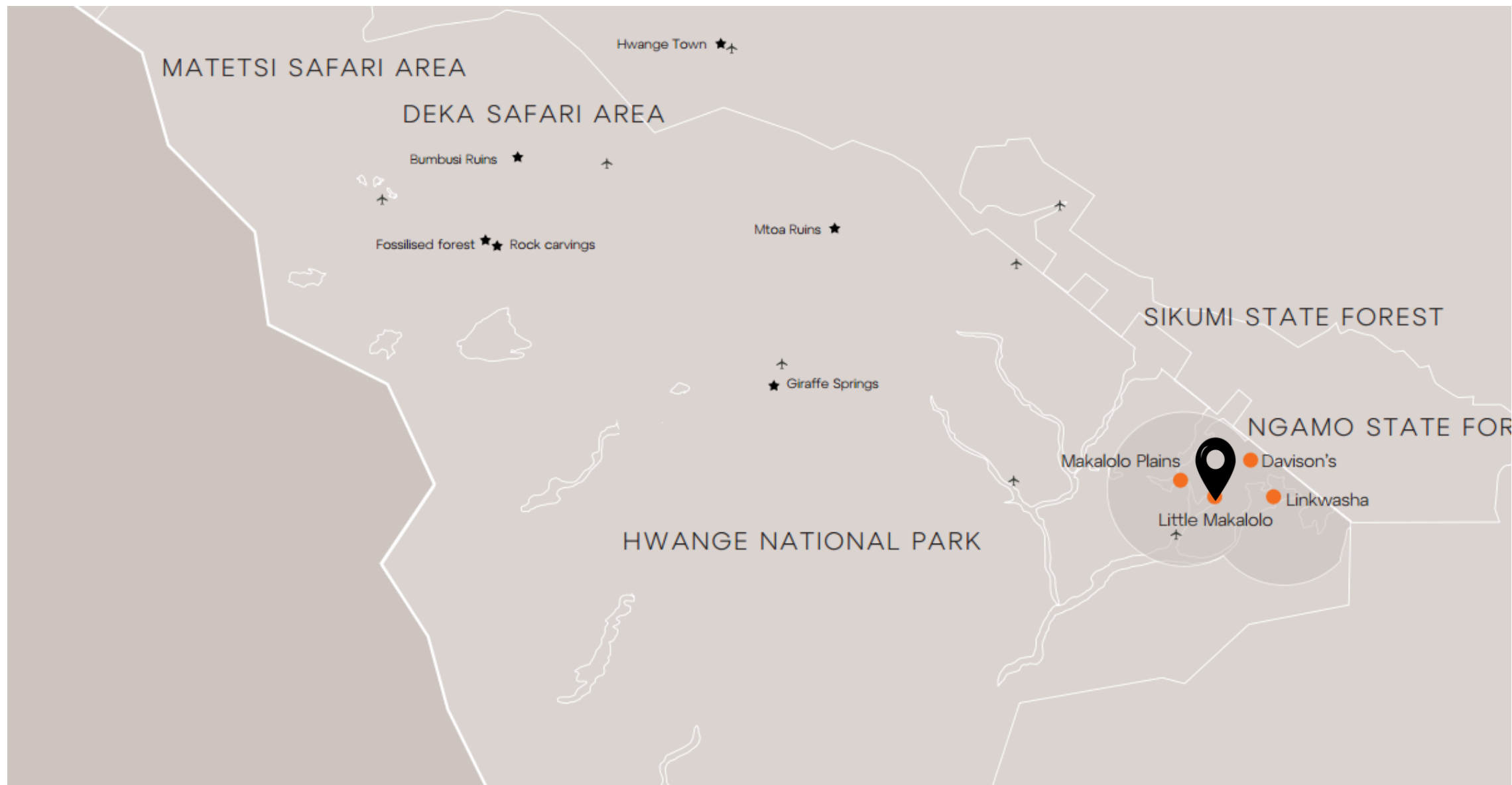

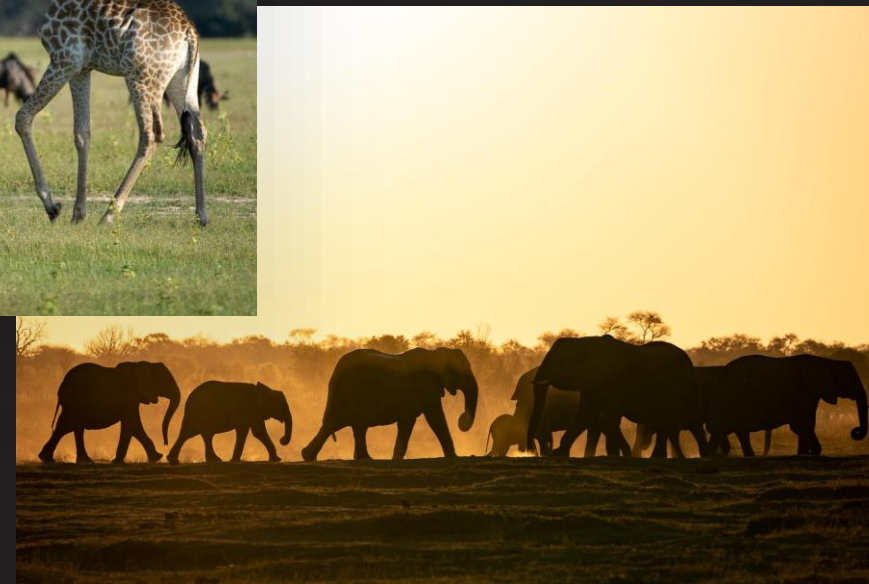




## UNIQUE SELLING POINTS

# Little Makalolo

- Experience the thrill of up-close-and-personal encounters with vast herds of elephants and buffalos from our famous log-pile hide in the dry months.
- Due to the ecological diversity (vast open palm-fringed plains, grasslands, acacia woodlands and teak forests) and fertile ground in the south-eastern corner of Hwange, and year-round access to water, the Makalolo Private Wilderness Reserve attracts high concentrations of plains game followed by their predators.
- Access to the equally abundant and adjacent Linkwasha Private Wilderness Reserve means Wilderness Safaris guests have exclusive access to 34,000 hectares (84,000 acres) of land.

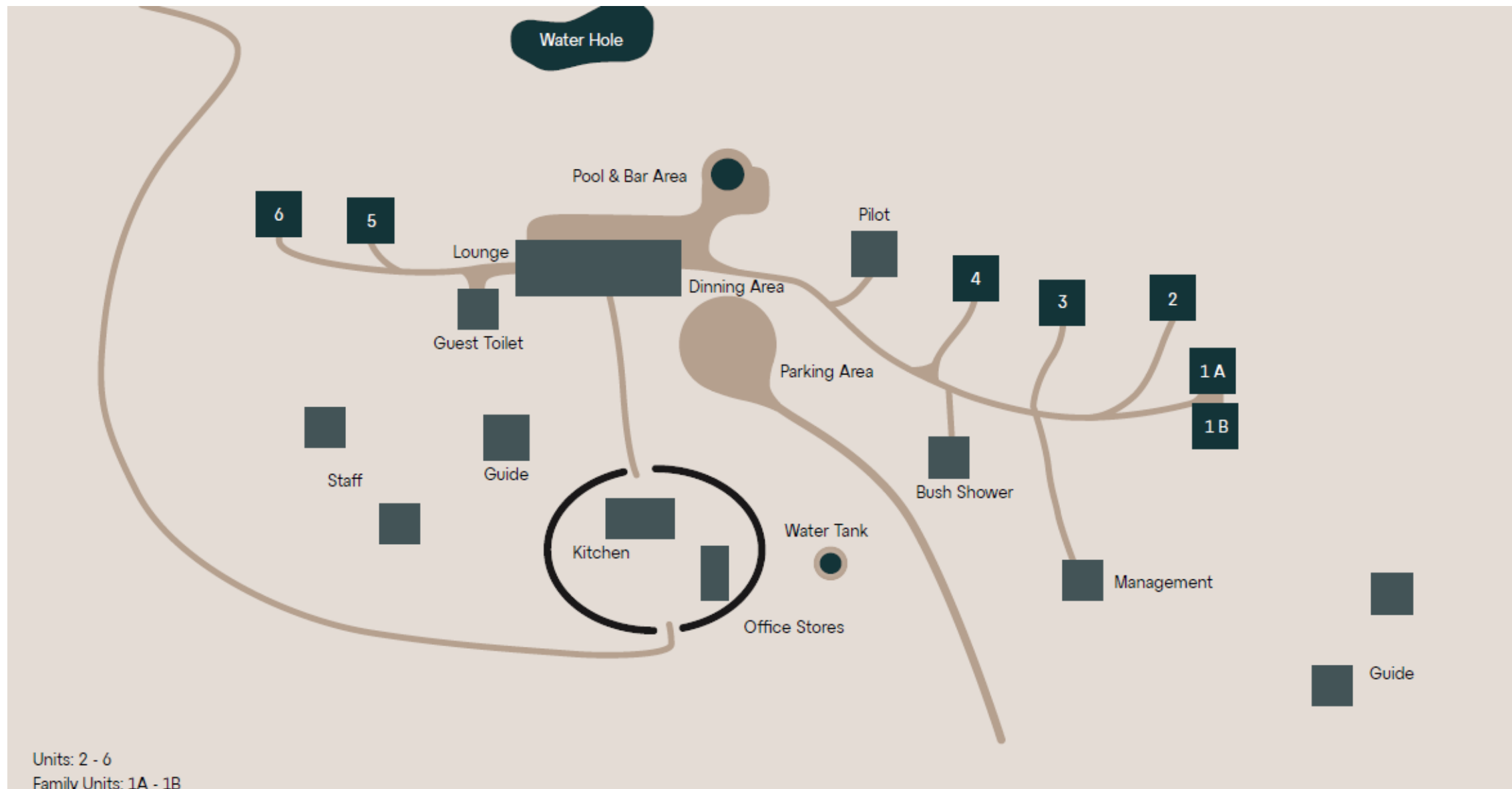

# An intimate camp

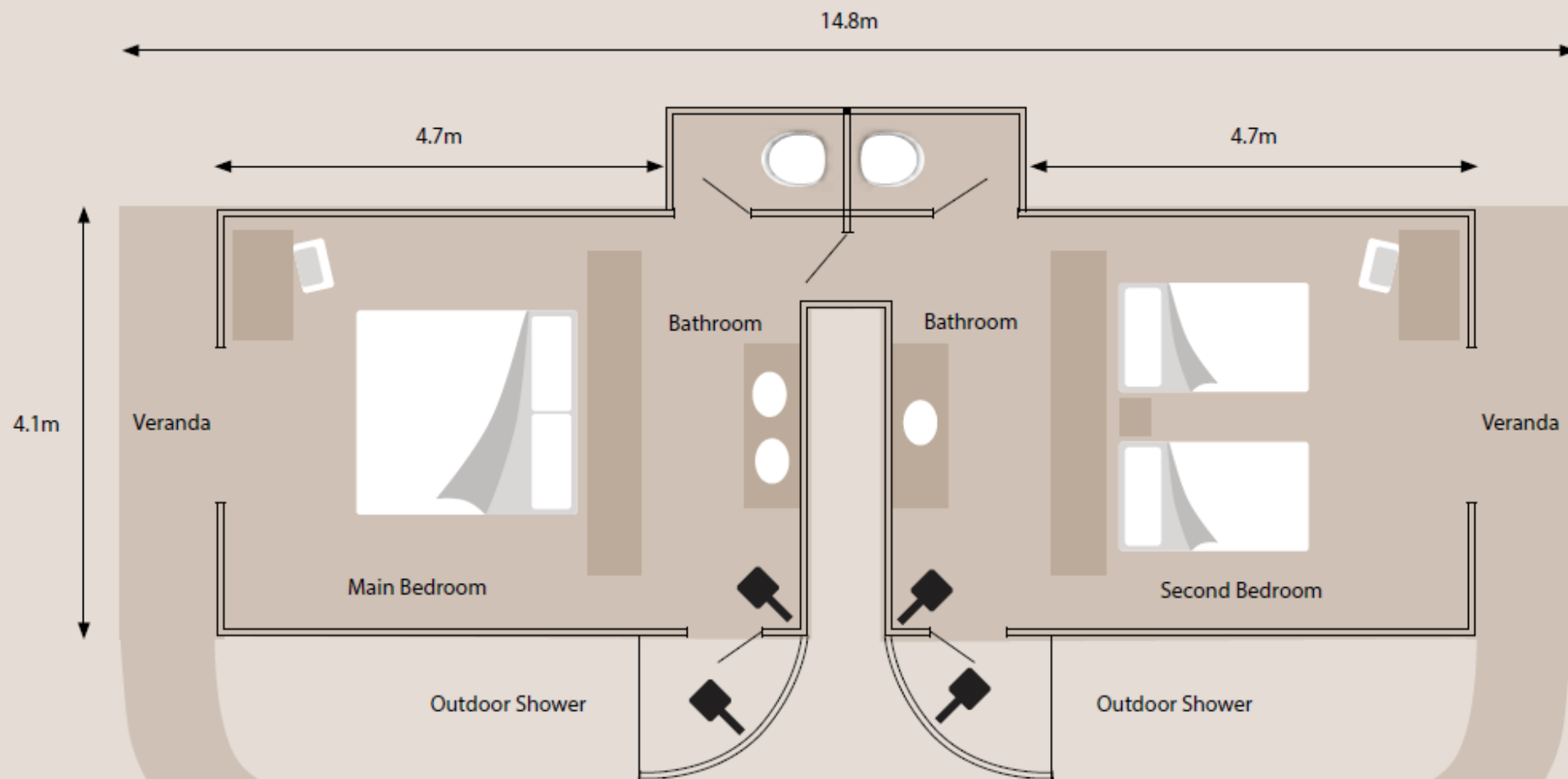
- With just six en-suite units (including a family room), intimate Little Makalolo is Hwange's original – and greatly cherished – bush camp, known for its exceptionally warm and genuine staff.
- The camp is thoughtfully laid out for a relaxed and intimate sojourn. Its unique features include a convivial fire pit for evenings under the stars, plus a raised pool and breakfast-bar area for thrilling views of the active waterhole in front of camp.




MAIN POOL & FIREPIT

What makes Little Makalolo so unique is that they are the only camp in that area with a hide, or “log pile”, as they call it, at the waterhole right in front of the centre. We sat in shaded comfort, spellbound, with unashamed tears running down our cheeks for two hours as over 90 elephants came to drink and play within 2 meters of us. We were humbled by the adults' sheer massive presence and almost slow-motion deliberate intelligence. We had substantial wide-open smiles as we watched their youngsters diving under and cavorting in the water. And as if that wasn't enough, we later sat in our game vehicle less than 30 meters away, staring at a herd of approx. Thirty elephants stampeded, shattering the air trumpeting as they thundered straight at a pride of 10 lions attempting to drink at the waterhole. I couldn't believe it as the lions bolted in every direction in an attempt to avoid being trampled!

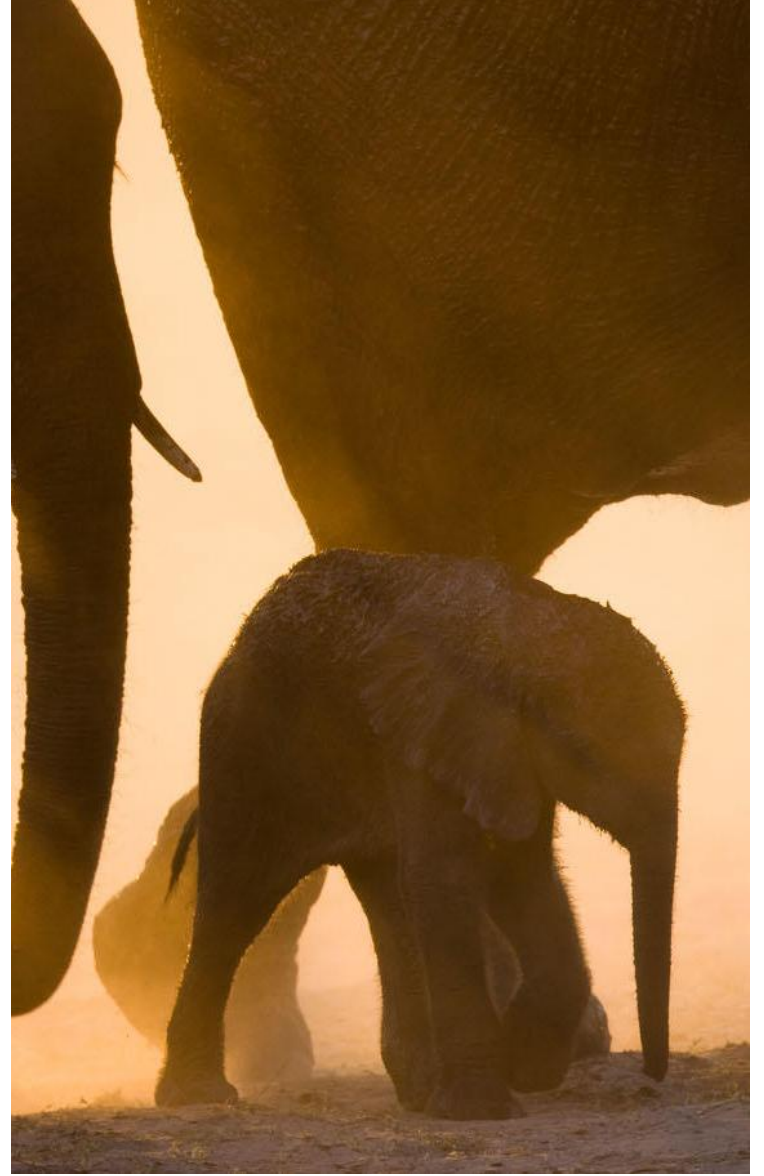
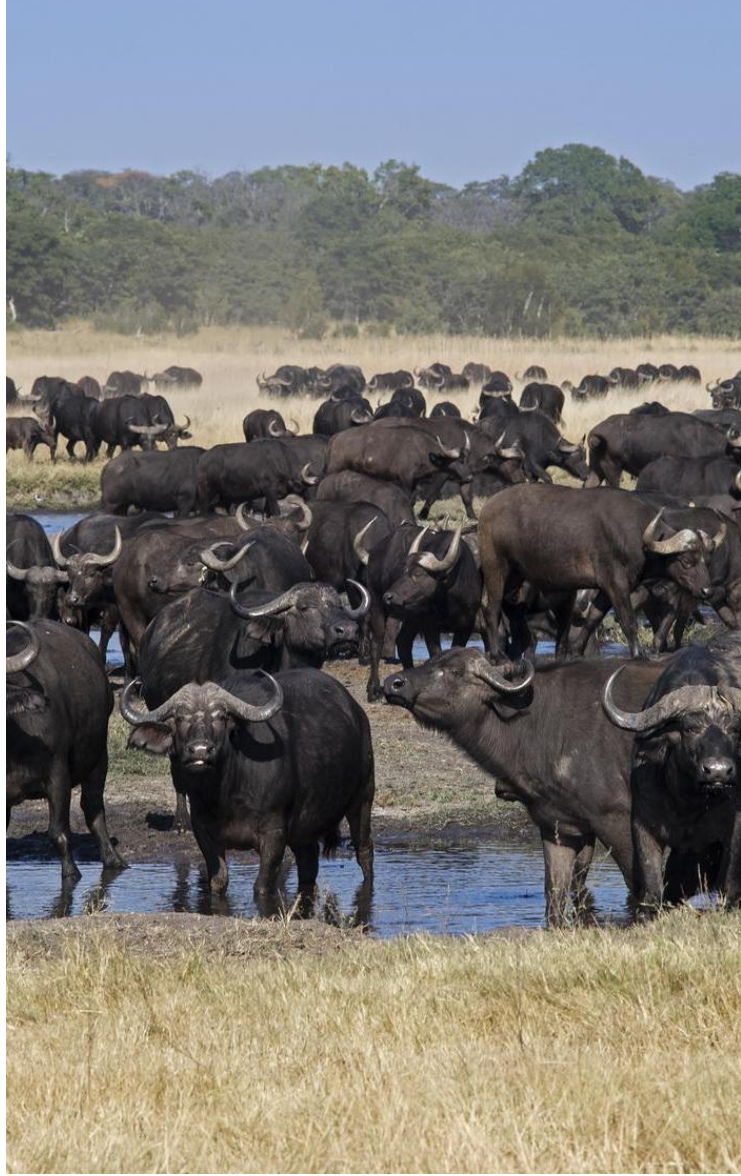
