

Bisate: Taking Shape

June will see the opening of our exciting new lodge and pioneering conservation project in Rwanda. Bisate Lodge, located in the Virunga Massif just outside Volcanoes National Park, is in the final stages of construction and is set to offer six sumptuous en-suite forest villas that maximise comfort, warmth and views while retaining environmental principles and reflecting the culture of surrounding rural Rwanda.

Under the careful, experienced and energetic management of Rob and Ingrid Baas, the team is going full steam ahead with the lodge building, developing activities, training staff, finalising suppliers and planting trees. What excites us most is that we believe this project will have a farreaching impact on the ecosystem of the Virunga Massif and the rural people living adjacent to it.








The Evolution of Wilderness Safaris Private Journeys

Little Vumbura Hourishes

This intimate gem of a camp, situated on a beautiful island in the private Vumbura Concession, has undergone a major renovation. Aside from new decking throughout camp, all six guest tents have increased in size by 30%. Large feature windows bring the outdoors inside, the bathrooms have been upgraded, and the bar has been revamped and expanded. The main area now includes some special spaces, such as a shaded pergola, another area for communal dining and a fire deck. To boot, new softs will add an air of freshness to the entire camp.






We are really excited to have begun rebuilding Mombo and Little Mombo Camps. While they will comprise the most appropriate and sustainable luxury as befits this world-famous destination, they will also remain rooted in an authentic bush-camp offering to ensure that the 'Original Mombo' experience is retained and honoured. Our emphasis has always been on sharing and celebrating the amazing natural environment in which we operate, along with service excellence; these new camps will continue to do just that – operating on 100% solar power and remaining committed to having as light an environmental footprint as possible. The breakdown project is being treated as sensitively as the build and our aim is to use the exact same footprint as that of the old camps.

In order to accommodate guests still wishing to travel to Mombo during the rebuild, Mombo Trails has been set up as temporary luxury tented camp two kilometres north-west of the current camp, overlooking the very same productive floodplain that has been the backdrop of Mombo for the last 15 years. Eight stylish suites reflect the magic and the mystique of the great African tented safaris of the early part of the last century, never forgetting for a moment that this is the Place of Plenty.
