# February 2019 – Botswana's Central Kalahari Game Reserve and Linyanti Concession

- Discover how our camps keep our remote areas pristine, through responsible waste elimination, water purification and recycling, while providing exceptional experiences for our guests.

#### About the Purpose

We have pioneered environmentally-sensitive camp architecture and infrastructure to achieve our goal of "purposeful luxury." Our ideal result is a camp that blends into the natural features of the site and becomes more so as time goes on. Our goal is that if at some stage we have to move the camp, we can restore the site to its original natural state, leaving no sign of our presence. The unspoilt wilderness in which we operate is fragile – so our footprint has to be light and gentle, whether in the desert environment of the Kalahari or the woodlands of the Linyanti.



# Segametsi Monnamorwa – Wilderness Safaris Environmental Department Manager



## Warren Ozorio - Wilderness Safaris Group Environmental Coordinator


