While COVID-19 has put our journeys on hold, Wilderness Safaris' enduring determination to change lives remains unequivocally true. For 37 years, the core of our conservation tourism business has been to create sustainable economic opportunity for rural communities living next to Africa's precious protected areas. Now, when they need us the most, our unwavering commitment to our neighbours has provided life-saving assistance to them, in the form of essential relief parcels.

Over 30 000 lives have been positively impacted since the April launch of our <u>Conservation Heroes – COVID-Relief Fund</u>, and we could not be more grateful for the generous support from our guests, trade partners, staff and especially our Chairman's Foundation for helping us to achieve this.

The vast majority of people living in rural African communities surrounding pristine wilderness areas rely on income from wildlife tourism to support their livelihoods. Often employed by Wilderness Safaris, and other safari operators, there is little to no alternative economic opportunity in these areas. The biggest contributor to livelihoods is salary income for people who work for tourism businesses. Alongside that, an entire industry of small businesses has developed around bigger tourism operators, forming an interdependent web of communities, wilderness, wildlife and travellers that benefits all.

When COVID struck, and worldwide travel bans and lockdowns were introduced, many of these people lost their livelihoods. Our Conservation Heroes campaign stepped in to help, providing crucial relief to those most impacted by the pandemic, with further handovers planned for the coming months.

"Getting the hampers to the most vulnerable is often the biggest challenge, as many of the villages are remote. It took us 11 hours to drive 500 km to Seronga. Tiring and testing roads, with potholes deep as a donkey standing. We saw evidence of malnutrition in some of the children, and people whose food was running out. They didn't know food was coming".

This has involved 12 separate delivery runs, comprising over 60 tons of food assistance. As Botswana now moves into the hottest and driest time of the year, the daily struggle for many communities will intensify. Even with some domestic tourism opening up in the region, community needs remain great.

In early September 2020, Wilderness Safaris Namibia distributed 400 food hampers to vulnerable families in the north-west Kunene region, with further handovers planned for October and November.

The hampers were delivered to five conservancies, including Doro Nawas, Torra, Anabeb, Sesfontein and Marienfluss. They contain essential groceries, including maize meal, salt, sugar, rice, cooking oil, soup and soap, and can sustain a family of four for a month.

A devastating drought has already destroyed many livelihoods here and, for many families, tourism had become their only source of revenue before COVID-19 struck. Communities like the Himba have been particularly hard hit. The area around Serra Cafema received a dismal three milimetres of rain last year, after a very dry spell, resulting in the Himba community losing their entire herd of cattle. Without the herd, and being unable to sell their crafts through tourism, support in the way of food parcels and essential goods was desperately needed.

Communities living in Namibia's most remote areas, who depend on tourism for their livelihoods have been severely affected. We travelled to these remote areas over a span of six days, covering 2 100 km to distribute the much-needed food parcels".



At the end of August 2020, Wilderness Safaris and Governors' Camp Collection had delivered over 1 600 food hampers (over 30 tons of food) to communities within Rwanda, positively impacting 850 families and over 4 000 people.

Governors' has also provided ongoing support for 90 single mothers for over 19 weeks, and Wilderness has provided health insurance for 244 community members in the Bisate village. Other projects include the installation of water tanks for additional hygiene measures at Bisate Primary School, the repair of two class rooms at Akayange Primary School near Magashi Camp, and assistance with face masks, sanitiser, soap, Tippy Taps, uniforms, shoes and school materials for students at Gisunzu Primary School near Gishwati – all in order to help prepare the schools for their imminent reopening post-lockdown.

Whilst tourism slowly starts up again at Bisate Lodge at Volcanoes National Park, communities surrounding other areas such as Akagera National Park and Gishwati may not see an immediate revival. This is why Wilderness Safaris' latest handover in August focused on supporting the most vulnerable members of the Gishwati community.

"In total we distributed 1 915 kg of maize, 987 kg of beans and 260 soap bars, amounting to over 3 tons of supplies. As we met with the people in the community they clapped, cheered and sang to express their gratitude to Wilderness Safaris and our generous Chairman's Foundation, whose contributions made this happen. The villagers are enthusiastic and feel the support, giving them hope for the future and the possible opportunities that will ariseastourismdevelopsfurtherinthe Gishwatiarea".

In the Zambezi region, Children in the Wilderness (CITW), Wilderness Safaris' non-profit partner, distributed 250 food parcels to vulnerable families, the elderly, and child-headed households in six of its partner communities in August, with further distributions planned for September and October. The first 250 hampers has positively impacted 1 510 people from the following regions in Zimbabwe: Victoria Falls, Hwange, Tsholotsho and Bulawayo, as well as Sinde and Livingstone in Zambia.

Despite food shortages in Zimbabwe causing many products to disappear off the shelves, CITW's food parcels contain one month's worth of essential items, including maize meal, rice, sugar beans and porridge, as well as matches and soap. Since the start of the COVID-19 lockdown in March, CITW has been providing additional support to its community partners through the provision of food relief, hygiene products as well as educational assistance in the form of student allowances, positively impacting a further 5 700 people in 18 villages.

"COVID-19 has affected everyone in the world, and calls for us to collectively assist our neighbouring, and most vulnerable, communities. With our long-standing partnership with these communities, we didn't hesitate to assist in any way possible. While we realise that there is still a long way to go in combating the challenges of the pandemic, we also acknowledge that a little can go a long way. We are extremely grateful for the support of our Chairman's Foundation to help us to continue making a difference".
