




AFRICA



Why we do what we do

- The environment is at the heart of our beliefs and values. Our quest is
 to come to understand the wilderness better, to respect it, to care for
 it and to share it with our guests.
- We are serious about what we do and believe fully in our vision of contributing meaningfully to African conservation.
- Our vision is encapsulated by "the 4Cs," a concept that suggests that our organisation aims to be truly sustainable by committing to the four dimensions of Commerce, Conservation, Community, and Culture:
 - Commerce deals with our ecotourism offerings and products and is perhaps the most critical element to sustainability in the modern world.
- Conservation is divided into Environmental Management Systems i.e., building and managing our camps in the most eco-friendly way possible, and Biodiversity Conservation i.e., the understanding, management and protection of the wildlife and ecosystems with which we are involved.
 - Community is all about the people at the heart of our business:
 Internal Community our staff across all our regions, and External
 Community comprising the rural communities that either own the land on which we operate or live adjacent to these areas.
 - Culture is a multifaceted element that governs respect for the culture of all employees as well as the remote rural communities surrounding the conservation areas.
- Our non-profit trusts the Wilderness Wildlife Trust and Children in the Wilderness help us drive this vision. The Wilderness Wildlife Trust funds projects addressing the needs of existing wildlife populations, seeks solutions to save threatened species and provides education and training for local communities. Children in the Wilderness is an environmental and life skills educational programme that focuses on the next generation of rural decision makers the children of Africa.





Designing your Safari

Designing your safari is an important part of your African journey. Given the immense diversity and topography of the continent, it is impossible to see everything in one trip or even a lifetime of return visits. Our in-house team and our specialist partners in the travel trade throughout the world are there to help you design your dream itinerary to maximise your experience.

What you should consider:

- Who you travel with. Are they in the best areas? Are they ethical and responsible? Are they a genuine ecotourism company that actively engages with conservation and community projects and attempts to lessen their own impact?
- Who you book with. Are they Africa specialists? How long have they been in business? Have they travelled to the places they are recommending? Do they visit Africa frequently and do they recommend responsible travelling?
- What countries and regions you visit. Africa is vast. And diverse.
 Prioritising what you see and do on your first visit is important, which is why time spent consulting your Africa specialist is so helpful; they are best positioned to explain the continent and focus your plans.
- How you combine those regions. Combining areas and regions is the best way to discover the diverse wildlife species that thrive in different habitats. Our camps are intentionally located where they are to make combinations both easy and rewarding. In Botswana, for example, it is worth combining the dryer areas of the Kalahari, the permanent swamps and waterways of the Okavango Delta and the mixed plains and woodlands of the Linyanti.

- When you should visit. Seasonality is important in your consideration, as different parts of the continent, and even regions within those parts, are at their best at different times of the year. Your Africa specialist is best positioned to advise you on this. For example, if you'd like to experience Africa's season of birth and abundance, or you're a birder, then summer is generally best. For those seeking dryer landscapes and teeming herds around limited water resources, winter is the season for you.
- How long your visit should be. Because of the vastness, the diversity, and
 the time that it can take to travel, it is important to allow enough time to
 comfortably cover all of the high points in your plans. It is a holiday after
 all and should be relaxing and adventurous in equal parts.
- What kind of accommodation you will stay in. We believe canvas, timber
 and thatch are the most sustainable building materials and also offer
 the most intimate encounters with Africa. Tents are no longer just rustic
 accommodation, but can be sumptuous, luxurious rooms that offer every
 conceivable comfort. Choosing the level of luxury is an important element.

Our Camps and Explorations

Our camps are typically small, intimate safari bases in superb locations, ranging in size from just three units to 20. Here, we want our guests to be immersed in Africa: while lying in bed to hear the roar of the lion, the calling of the frogs, the sigh of the wind. In order to satisfy individual needs, we have several classes of accommodation as explained below.

Of paramount importance to us is that our camps have as little impact on the environment as possible. This is relevant not only during the building process, but also during day-to-day operating, and takes into account all elements of environmental impact, from the visual and aural implications to effects on soil, the water table, vegetation, game movement, and so on.



Premier Camps

Our Premier camps comprise our most elegant and stylised accommodation. These camps combine exclusive luxury and superbly designed architecture with the warm comforts of home and personal service.



Classic Camps

Our Classic camps are luxury tented camps, all offering superb facilities and accommodation, the en-suite bedrooms being slightly smaller than those of our Premier camps.



Adventures Camps

Larger camps than our Premier or Classic camps, the units are generally tented, extremely comfortable with en-suite bathrooms and all the amenities to make you feel at home. Note: activities at these camps may be at extra cost.



Explorations

Our fully serviced guided journeys create a sense of exclusive camping in Africa. A variety of travel modes and activities explore mostly private concessions and wildlife areas exclusive to Wilderness Safaris guests. Accommodation ranges from tailor-made camp sites to luxurious Wilderness Safaris camps.



.On Game Drive

Viewing elephants (Hwange, Zimbabwe)

A game drive is the essential ingredient of any safari, being one of the best ways to view wildlife. Not only are you able to cover considerable distances and differing habitats of an area in a short space of time, but our 4x4 vehicles are a good vantage point from which to watch wildlife safely.


Game drives take place in the early morning seeing the bush spring to life as the day dawns, and in the afternoon and evening, where there is a chance of seeing nocturnal predators as they wake from their day's rest.

Since the majority of our camps are located on private concessions, our game drive vehicles seldom have to jostle for place at an exciting sighting.









... On the Water


One of the more romantic ways of enjoying the wilderness is on the water. It is the quintessential element of any trip to the Okavango where guests float silently along the blue channels of the Delta in traditional mekoro (dugout canoes). Motorboats are also used for transfers as well as for seasonal catch-and-release fishing.

Our camps in the Victoria Falls region – both in Zambia and Zimbabwe – are launch pads for numerous and adventurous water excursions, while further down the mighty Zambezi, in northern Zimbabwe, the Mana Canoe Trail is known to be one of the most exciting safaris in Africa.

In Malawi, boating on the Shire River exposes rich shore- and freshwater-based life, while kayaking and other water sports add excitement to the splendour of the great Lake Malawi.







...In Camp

Our 'home away from home' camps are not only places where you will sleep, but are idyllic, well-appointed retreats where you can relax between activities; indeed, nursing a cup of coffee around the fire or sipping a gin and tonic while looking out over a quintessential African view is as much part of the experience as a game drive.

Each camp has its own individual style and is often designed using cultural elements of the area. A lounge and bar area and deck all look out onto a feature of interest or beauty. Most camps have swimming pools to float in in the midday sun and some even have star-beds, outdoor showers and massage treatments for your enjoyment.

...On Foot

Walking on safari has always been regarded as one of the finest ways to get to know the African wilderness. Aside from the excitement of viewing wildlife, walking through the untamed, remote bush allows you to get your feet on the ground and away from vehicles, to really feel, smell and touch Africa.

Walks range from a short morning or afternoon walk (guide- and season-dependent) to three-day walking trails, staying overnight in tented camps. Guest safety is of utmost importance and each walk or trail is led by highly skilled professional guides.



...In the Air

Travelling by air is the best way of showcasing the scenic expanse and remoteness of the areas in which we operate. Transferring from camp to camp on Wilderness Air is a seamless way of ensuring a smooth journey as well as appreciating the magnificence and scale of the continent.

Another way of appreciating the magnificent landscapes is by helicopter. Some of our camps even offer hot air ballooning for a quieter and more peaceful perspective of the wilderness, often ending in a well-deserved champagne breakfast!










...At Meals




...Underwater

Not just "on" the water, but under it – our beach destinations, namely the warm waters of the Indian Ocean around North Island in the Seychelles, and Rocktail Beach Camp, South Africa, reveal the exciting world of underwater safaris. Both destinations are known for their abundance of aquatic life, from small colourful fish, rays and turtles to larger dolphins, whales and sharks. Snorkelling and diving in these regions is hugely rewarding.

Freshwater Lake Malawi National Park also offers magical experiences in its crystal-clear waters. With 2 ooo species of mostly colourful fish called cichlids, it's no wonder this region of the Lake is often considered to be the best freshwater diving and snorkelling location on the planet.






...With your Family




Fresh wholesome food cooked on the fire (Okavango Delta, Botswana)




... For Conservation


Just by going on safari with Wilderness Safaris our guests contribute to conservation.










Where will you go on Safari?





Our concessions and traversing areas cover more than three million hectares (eight million acres) across the most important wildlife habitats in nine countries: Botswana, Congo, Kenya, Malawi, Namibia, Seychelles, South Africa, Zambia and Zimbabwe.

More than thirty years ago we fell in love with these remote and wild places and realised that in order to help protect them we needed to share them with discerning, globally caring travellers who could help promote awareness for these areas around the world. Our goal therefore is to share these wild areas with guests from all over the planet in as sustainable a way as possible, while at the same time helping to ensure the future protection of Africa's spectacular wildlife heritage and sharing the benefits of tourism with local communities.

As a result, our philosophy is to use our brand of responsible ecotourism to bring people to the key wildlife areas in each country in which we operate and as such, we have built luxurious, intimate and environmentally-appropriate retreats in each of the key destinations. The pages that follow aim to introduce you to these myriad places and help you to choose which areas in Africa you visit.



Situated in the centre of southern Africa, landlocked Botswana has Namibia, South Africa, Zambia and Zimbabwe as its neighbours. With the exception of the eastern part where the summer rainfall is slightly higher, the **Kalahari Desert** forms the majority of Botswana. This predominance of arid land makes for a remarkable phenomenon: The celebrated **Okavango Delta** is a wondrous wetland within a desert, receiving its waters from rain falling over a thousand kilometres away, and sustaining a huge diversity of fauna and flora. In the north-east of the country, the Chobe and **Linyanti** reserves are renowned for their predators and large concentrations of game.

Prior to independence in 1966, Botswana was an unexplored land visited only by hardy adventurers. Then diamonds were discovered and Botswana embarked on an innovative tourism development plan, the second largest export sector after this sought-after mineral. The country's leaders took the view that high-quality low-volume tourism was the best way to create a sustainable industry that would employ a large percentage of its people while still preserving the environment. In this way over 40% of the country has been set aside for wildlife and as a result, Botswana has all the right ingredients to be a top safari destination for the responsible traveller.







NAMIBIA

Aptly named after the Namib, the oldest desert on the planet, Namibia, on the south-west coast of Africa, is celebrated for its sea of red sand along the Atlantic coastline, vast open landscapes, infinite supply of blue skies, sun-drenched weather, and star-filled nights.

Over the years, there have been a number of cultural influences that have all added to the unique atmosphere of Namibia. At various times, Germany, Great Britain and South Africa have all governed the territory, but it was with the independence of Namibia in 1990 that the country was able to develop its multicultural character and reinvent itself. There is a distinctive Namibian character that blends African styles with European influences on architecture, food, customs and art.

All this is in interesting juxtaposition with the expansive landscapes that surround the cities. The many national parks and game reserves boast a huge variety of wildlife in a kaleidoscope of differing environments: the white saltpans of **Etosha National Park**, the red dunes at **Sossusvlei**, lonely beaches along the Skeleton Coast, and the uninhabited wilderness of **Kunene**. Astonishing contrasts are everywhere for the visitor to savour, enjoy and photograph.





ZAMBIA

Zambia is one of the continent's least travelled and most rewarding wildlife and cultural destinations. Landlocked in south-central Africa, it consists of a vast plateau 3 000 m above sea level, the animal-rich river valleys of the **Luangwa** and Lower Zambezi, and the tropical north of Lake Tanganyika. Livingstone is the 'adventure capital', offering adrenalin-packed activities on and around **Victoria Falls** and the Zambezi River. It was in Zambia that the concept of walking safaris originated, still an excellent way of enjoying the rich flora and fauna of the country's 19 national parks. Birdlife is particularly prolific and unique species draw birders from all over the world. This is still Africa undiscovered with a timeless sense of wilderness.

ZIMBABWE

Zimbabwe is blessed with wonderful scenery, unspoilt wilderness areas and exciting wildlife. The great Zambezi River is its northern frontier, along which is one of the world's natural wonders: Victoria Falls, while the languid Limpopo forms the southern border with South Africa. In between is a variety of habitats, from the granite hills of the Matopos and the majestic mountains, lush forests and rivers of the Eastern Highlands, to the unspoilt, peaceful northern parks in which Wilderness Safaris is to be found. Mana Pools National Park, located on the Zambezi River, offers superb wildlife viewing and vistas. Along the Botswana border, Hwange National Park is home to some of southern Africa's last great elephant, buffalo and sable herds.




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
SOUTH AFRICA

Situated at the southern edge of the African continent, South Africa is bounded by oceans on three sides with an interior of an assortment of habitats, from lush tropical forests to arid deserts, mountains to open bushveld savannah. Since the first democratic elections in 1994, South Africa has become one of the world's top travel destinations, blending elements of both 'Africa of old' with modernity: wilderness areas contrasting with modern cities such as **Cape Town**.

Kruger National Park is famous as a premier wildlife and bird viewing destination, while the coastline offers superb vistas, sandy beaches and sheer, forest-covered cliffs. Amazing marine encounters, from southern right whales to pristine coral reefs, can be encountered along its great coastline especially in the Rocktail Bay region in northern KwaZulu-Natal.

This habitat diversity is echoed in the country's peoples and history. The first human inhabitants – the San or Bushman people – and the powerful civilisations of Mapungubwe and Thulamela who traded with Chinese and Arab traders a thousand years ago have given way to a 21st-century country filled with a colourful mixture of people and cultures, a heady history and a natural heritage that has South Africans proudly describing their land as "a world in one country."

MALAWI

Malawi is a little-known gem of a country in the heart of Africa; long, narrow and landlocked, it covers more than 1 000 km (621 mi) from north to south. Lake Malawi, the third largest water body in Africa, dominates the countryside, a sparkling blue mass of water famed for its abundance and diversity of fish life.

Malawi's geography is sculptured by Africa's Great Rift Valley: towering mountains, lush, fertile valley floors and enormous crystal-clear lakes which are all hallmarks of much of this geological phenomenon. The country's diverse ecology is protected within nine national parks and game reserves, of which Nyika National Park is one. It is the only big game Afromontane area in south-central Africa, known for its rolling hills, high-altitude grassland, and pockets of endemism. Another star attraction is **Liwonde National Park**, considered the most prolific wildlife area in Malawi and dominated by the Shire, the country's largest river.

Malawi is also one of the best places in Africa to meet and interact with the local inhabitants or visit a rural community in an atmosphere totally devoid of either expectation or affectation. Here, you will start to understand why the country is known as the "warm heart of Africa."



MALAWI EXPLORATIONS





The sparsely populated Republic of the Congo is a surprising gem with seemingly endless tropical forest and fingers of moist savannah covering its interior. Spared the conflict of neighbouring Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC), and not having shared neighbouring Gabon's recent limelight, tourism to the Congo is at a fledgling stage with an aura of exploration and discovery enhancing every journey into its interior.

Congo's northern rainforest is largely pristine and is the heart of the Congo Basin, the world's second largest expanse of tropical rainforest. Aside from a host of forest biodiversity, it holds by far the majority of the world population of western lowland gorillas.

Rivers such as the Sangha, Mambili and the mighty Congo drain this basin and provide a means of exploration through dense forests and access to remote national parks such as **Odzala-Kokoua**, and Nouabale-Ndoki. It is in these areas that endemic wildlife flourishes and traditional forest dweller cultures persist.



KENYA

Kenya, one of East Africa's premier safari destinations, spans the equator and is bordered by Tanzania, Uganda, Sudan, Ethiopia and Somalia. One of the country's most spectacular geological features is the Great Rift Valley which passes through the country – an approximately 6 ooo km (3 700 mi) long fracture in the crust of the Earth running in a series of valleys from Syria to Mozambique.

Kenya's biodiversity is fascinating. Endless savannah plains and scorched deserts are interrupted by snow-capped mountains, cool highlands and equatorial forests and draws to an end at its scenic, paradisiacal coastline. These diverse habitats offer endless opportunities for adventures and new discoveries including the remarkable phenomenon of the wildebeest migration, the largest single movement of herd animals on the planet.

Laikipia, located in the central highlands of Kenya, is considered the bountiful and fertile breadbasket of the Kenyan people. Four rivers, one of which is perennial, flow through the area, making for an even more compelling habitat for animals and people alike. In these river valleys are to be found the sacred, preeminent fields of a nation still tied to agriculture, but which simultaneously strives to live in harmony with its wildlife.



SEYCHELLES

The Republic of Seychelles is a cluster of 115 Indian Ocean islands off Africa's east coast. Lying just south of the equator and beyond the cyclone belt, surrounded by warm waters, Seychelles epitomises the expression 'tropical island paradise'.

Seychelles is divided into 43 **Inner Islands** – the only oceanic islands of granitic composition on Earth – and the Outer Islands – five groups of flat, low-lying coral atolls and reef islets. Some 30 km (18 mi) from the main island of Mahé, the 210-hectare (580-acre) Ile du Nord, or **North Island**, comprises three granite outcrops, luminous white beaches, coconut palms and takamaka trees. The warm, clear waters surrounding the island are filled with an abundance of sea life in and amongst the hard and soft corals that litter the ocean floor.


The Seychellois themselves call their home "Forever Eden" and for good reason. More than 1 000 flowering plant species and over 220 bird species are recorded, and insects, amphibians and reptiles abound—amongst them the smallest frog and the largest land tortoise in the world. Mammals are less abundant as befits island ecosystems, with the most common being the famous flying fox, a large fruit bat.

During camp, the curriculum covers environmental education, HIV/ AIDS and nutrition and life skills, and the importance of conservation. No less importantly, throughout the year, Eco Clubs are held at the local schools (i.e. schools situated near Wilderness Safaris areas), where we can visit the children in their own environment, providing opportunities for all learners who are interested in the environment to meet, learn, discuss and expand their knowledge of their natural heritage.

Our guests can be proud to be part of this life-changing journey.





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


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
